Library is partially automated using an integrated library system that is developed and maintained by Campus iLIB . The package supports all required operations of the library. The system consists of system module of book procurement , technical process , circulation and OPAC Bibliographic records of complete volume of book collections in the library , which are available in the library database are accessible in the library OPAC . The Campus iLib Software in LAN Environment of SQL Server. Sufficient number of PCs are placed for the users to access the web. The database of books available in the library is being updated on day to day basis with details of recently acquired books through the book acquisition module . The records of the students automatically get generated to the library patron database as soon as they get their identity cards. All the operations and services of the library have been automated with bar code technology using "Campus iLib" software. 1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

• The institution strongly believes that the effective teaching is one that will bring about the intended learning outcome. The commencement of each academic year marks the launch of various academic activities. Lesson Plan for each course, covering a semester, is well-planned with relevant practical experience integrated into the teaching-learning process. • Each faculty maintains Logbook which is a document to record the implementation of the master lesson plan. The book shall be maintained by the members up-to-date for submission to the Principal on the 5th of every month. • The academic programmes of the institution is complemented effectively by way of organizing numerous special lectures, invited talks by each department throughout the year in a way which will make the student proficient in correlating the academic content delivered in the class rooms with the inputs offered by industry experts. • The institution is quite conscious of infusing professional touch to all courses by way of enlisting the services of top professionals in every domain to be a part of the teacher- learning practices carried out in the institution. • The institution has put in place a strong internal evaluation system by way of Continuous Internal Assessment which often tests the comprehension of the students through conduct of examinations periodically as the lesson progresses. • Handbook is given to all the members of faculty and students in the beginning of the academic year. • Before allocation of subjects, a detailed comparative analysis of subject requirement and staff skill sets are made in the form of Competency Mapping. Subjects are allocated based on their proficiency, experience and interest. • The progress of the syllabi coverage and performance of the Staff and Students in the Internal/University examinations are regularly monitored through Class Committee Meetings which are conducted at regular intervals to get the feedback from the students on effectiveness of curriculum delivery. • The Feedback is taken as the parameter for improving the teaching skills. This is done on a five point scale with a set of questions. Corrective measures are taken wherever necessary. The below average, average and good teachers are guided for improvement and the excellent teachers are appreciated by the Principal. Formally, during the middle and at the end of each semester, the feedback is

collected from the students on the syllabus coverage, curriculum delivery and teaching effectiveness. • Based on the University norms, Practical Examinations are conducted and the marks are awarded based on the spilt up given by the University. • Besides, the institution brings subject experts and guest faculty/ visiting faculty to give practical exposure to the students on the subject topics. • Workshops are conducted by each department with the help of industry experts, in order to equip the faculty and students. • Faculty members attend Refresher Programmes such as FDPs in order to gain more expertise in their subjects. ICT enabled teaching methodology is implemented in order to ensure that the curriculum is delivered effectively.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

From the observation about 85 of the students were responded positively and were satisfied with the components of curriculum. From the analysis only 20 of the students has been an idea of restructuring their syllabus with adequate practical hours for their major subjects. So far close to 90 of the respondents were found to be content with the present allocation of hours meant for practical training by the university. The feedback analysis from the students about their class tutors revealed that they all are with multi dimensional personality as well as strong in their academic aspects. 100 coverage of all sample population has been done and found no abnormal behaviour and learning disabilities are found so far. From the observation, tutors are asked to motivate and encourage students in every possible manner. Over all the tutors

take care of the students physical and mental well being of the students. The employers of the students of this institution from whom the responses elicited have responded based upon their exposure, knowledge in their respective subjects. Nearly 65 of the employers expressed satisfaction with the level of subject knowledge exhibited by the students while at work. In some instances, there were a few poor communicators found but a very small percentage. This feat is attributable to the certificate programmes offered in the first years of enrolment in their respective degree programmes. Nearly, 96 of the students were seen possessing excellent inter personal skills. Team spirit, the exhibition of togetherness and bonding while carrying out the organizational goals with the sense of purpose was quite evident in the analysis that about 73 of the respondents were estimated to be having tendency to identify themselves with the common cause, as per the estimation of the employers. Overall about 86 of the observed situations of evaluation by employers were quite satisfactory. The student alumni has been attested by a great majority of about 87 for their responses by giving thumbs up to it. The college is having sufficient infrastructural and academic resources of modern teaching environment in tune with the times. The varied resources of the institution has received an approved rating of 73 while emphasizing that much needs to be done as per changing times. The Institution itself is providing wide array of higher educational avenues for students by providing the WiFi facility in the campus. With regards to hostel 57 of the respondents were satisfied with the food and other amenities. Still, a lot needs to be improved is the collective refrain of the sample population. Though students have expressed satisfaction with present set of amenities with a approval rating of 79, the need for improvisation is the felt need among the responding students. It is observed that more than 80 of the parents have opined in a positive manner regarding academic content delivery followed in the institution, reasoning that this is the attribute which drew them, to admit their wards into this institution. Overall, 96 of the parents were satisfied.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

• **Centralized Continuous Internal Evaluation System:** Assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning process. As a part of sound educational strategy, the institution adopts Centralized Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System to assess all aspects of a student's development on a continuous basis throughout the year.

• **Orientation on Evaluation Process:** Students are made aware of the evaluation process through the following initiatives:

- The orientation programmes at the beginning of the semester through public address system of the college
- Teaching Plan contains evaluation procedures
- Academic Calendar with CIA Exam dates
- Orientation on changes and amendments in the evaluation process through Tutorial Meetings
- Display in the College and Department Notice Board
- Result Analysis Review Meeting: Result Analysis is done by the class tutors after every CIA Test. Pass percentage of each course is calculated by dividing the total number of students appeared and passed in each course. The performance of the students is monitored by the Principal and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members. The Principal conducts Review Meetings department wise to give necessary feedback for the improvement of students' performance.
- Progress Reports Parents Meetings: The institution is keen on monitoring the performance of the students and reports to the Parents. Progress Reports are sent by the tutors to the parents after each of the test. Parents/ Guardians are advised to note the performance of their wards and take remedial measure if needed. Whenever necessary, the tutor shall recommend the visit of the parent to the college for a discussion about the student.
- Remedial Classes are conducted for the slow learners, absentees and the students who participate in Sports, NSS activities and Placement Interviews. This practice helps struggling learners to update their subject knowledge and helps them to catch up with their peers.
- Booster Classes are conducted for the first five class toppers. The practice enables the students work harder in aiming at securing university ranks.
- External examinations of three hours duration will be conducted at the end of every semester for all the theory papers and practical papers. Students should satisfy the eligibility criteria of 75 attendance in each semester to appear for University Examination. The students who have arrears are permitted to write their papers in both the semester examinations.
- Representation in the Board of Studies: The senior faculty members are appointed by the University act as the member of Board of Studies. At Every meeting they suggest evaluation reforms and discuss any discrepancy in the Passing Board meeting. At the time of central valuation the examiners have the facilities to represent any out of syllabus questions. The chairman of the valuation Board will take necessary action.
- Supplementary Examinations are held for the final year students who have appeared and failed in any one of the semester theory papers relating to completion of his/her degree.
- Reappearing/Recounting/Revaluation: The students are informed of the Reappearing/Recounting/Revaluation scheme available to them. Retotalling is permitted for U.G. students who apply for it within the stipulated time on payment of prescribed fee. Revaluation is

permitted only for the papers written in regular U.G. examinations and not for arrear examinations.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Handbook and the Academic Calendar are prepared well in advance (6 months before the reopening of the college) after referring to Bharathiar University Calendar. Through Internet browsing, the Public Holidays are identified. Accordingly, the dates for the three CIA Tests per semester are fixed in the academic calendar. The Internal Tests are conducted in a centralised manner. Before finalising the dates, it is made sure that there is sufficient time for syllabus coverage. The Units I and II of the syllabus are completed for CIA Test I, Units III and IV for CIA Test II and All the units for CIA Test III. The attendance in all the three CIA Tests is compulsory. Progress Reports are sent to the parents after each of these tests. Parents/Guardians are advised to note the performance of their wards and take remedial measures if needed. In order to adhere to the dates mentioned in the calendar, HODs meetings are conducted frequently by the Principal to speed up the syllabus coverage. The HODs, in turn, convene departmental meetings and motivate the faculty members to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time. The systematic planning of the lessons and the implementation of the planning are clearly indicated in the logbooks. The staff members prepare lesson plans in the logbooks before the commencement of every semester with a view to syllabus coverage.

Library The Library located in SNMV College is a full fledged learning resource that caters to the academic and intellectual needs of students and faculty

members. The college has an ever growing library with 24, 810 volumes containing the latest valuable editions by experts. Library is partially automated using an integrated library system that is developed and maintained by Campus iLIB. Separate collection of reference books, bound volumes of journals, Video CDS, Audio Cassettes and compact Disc. We are presently subscribing up to 65 professional periodicals of which 11 are international journals and 39 national journals and 17 both national and international magazines, for which the total subscription amount is around Rs. 2, 00,000/per year. Institution has registered with the National Digital Library sponsored by MHRD. Our Students have registered in the digital portal to access E Resources, Theses and Dissertations. The Best Library User Award, initiated in 2006/2007, sponsored by the Management, has been found successful in inculcating the reading habit among the students. Laboratories Chemistry Laboratory The chemistry laboratory is designed with all the statutory norms and safety standards. It enables personal verification of important experimental facts.

Also the Laboratory is equipped with sophisticated instruments such as Spectrophotometer, Rotary Shaker, pH Meter, Hot Air Oven, Centrifuges, Distillation Unit and Water bath. Physics Laboratory Department of physics is equipped with electronic, electrical, magnetic, thermal, microprocessor and general physics equipment's like Galvanometer, Telescope, Microscope, Ammeter, CRO, CRT, Frequency meter and Spectrometer. Microbiology Biotechnology Laboratory The Department of Microbiology Biotechnology has spacious and well equipped laboratory with independent undergraduate and postgraduate laboratories. Airconditioned laboratories equipped with the high tech instruments like PCR, Lyophilizer, Fermentor, UV Spectrophotometer, Phase Contrast Microscope and Inverted microscope. There are separate, plant tissue culture, animal cell culture and microbial cell culture labs and a walk in cold room. Computer Laboratory The Institution has seven computer labs with hightech laptops, desktops and NComputing systems (Green Environment systems). 503 desktops and laptops are networked through a Local Area Network (LAN). The campus is also WiFi enabled which allows the faculty and students to utilize the labs and department systems for concepts in the curriculum not only for courses related to the Computer Stream, but also for myriad other courses with computer based design and analysis.. The labs provide onetoone access to students for a variety of peripherals. The available servers are Windows 2003, Windows 2008, Windows 2012, and Linux. Employees are invited to share in the decisionmaking process of the firm by participating in activities such as setting goals, determining work schedules, and making suggestions. Participative management, however, involves more than allowing employees to take part in making decisions. It also involves management treating the ideas and suggestions of employees with consideration and respect. The most extensive form of participative management is direct employee ownership of a company. A participative management style offers various benefits at all levels of the organization. By creating a sense of ownership in the company, participative management instills a sense of pride and motivates employees to increase productivity in order to achieve their goals. Employees who participate in the decisions of the company feel like they are a part of a team with a common goal, and find their sense of selfesteem and creative fulfillment heightened. Changes are implemented more effectively when employees have input and make contributions to decisions. Participation keeps employees informed of upcoming events so they will be aware of potential changes. The organization can then

place itself in a proactive mode instead of a reactive one, as managers are able to quickly identify areas of concern and turn to employees for solutions. Participation helps employees gain a wider view of the organization. Through training, development opportunities, and information sharing, employees can acquire the conceptual skills needed to become effective managers or top executives. It also increases the commitment of employees to the organization and the decisions they make. Faculty members from the college are encouraged to send suggestions to the board of studies to make relevant modification in the syllabus. The faculty handling add on courses are encouraged to frame the syllabus. A Curriculum Review Committee has been formed in the institution meetings are convened frequently by this committee along with the principal and staff representatives from all the departments. Each staff representative puts forth the suggestion form the improvement of the syllabus. They also give justification for changes to be carried out. The principal and the chairman of the Curriculum Review Committee scrutinize the suggestions and accurate decisions are taken. Based on these suggestions, letters are send to the members of Board of Studies. As a result of this, a few changes have been brought about in the Curriculum.
Teaching and Learning	Subjects are allotted to the staff Based on Competency mapping. Their experience and subject expertise are taken into account . Lesson Plans are prepared and log books are maintained. The well -ventilated, spacious class room Create a conducive environment for the teaching learning process. Quality faculty members are selected by the interview panel which consists of management representatives, Principal, Director, Deans and HODS. Preference is

given to experience and qualification like M.Phil , Ph.D, SLET and NET. The candidate handle classes before the interview panel, and the panel members check their communication and presentation skills. Three seminar halls, Audio visual room Digital Library ,Reading hours in the library make the learning process interesting and lively .Visiting and guest faculty are invited frequently to update the knowledge of the stakeholders and also in project preparation .WiFi facility is also available. Lesson planning is done in order to plan the syllabus as per university requirement. The same is handed over to the students well in advance, so that they can come prepared for the regular academic sessions. Once the class is completed ,log book is also completed which is verified by the Head of the Departments and the principal.

Examination and Evaluation

- As per Bharathiar University Norms. Examination committee is formed at the college level, to conduct internal as well as University Examinations smoothly in a centralized manner. Question Bank , model Question paper , weekly tests and model practicals prepare the students to face the examinations without fear and stress. • Two CIA Tests(Continuous Internal Assessment) and a Model Examination are conducted before the University Examinations. These tests are conducted transparently and in the University Examination Pattern .Internal marks are awarded based on the examination in order to avoid subjectivity bias. • Result Analysis of CIA Tests I, II and III are prepared and discussed with the Principal. Proper counselling is given to the staff and Remedial Classes are arranged for the slow learners. Progress reports are sent to the parents. Parents are informed about the poor performance of their wards. • After the Publication of the result of University Examinations, students can apply for retotalling , revaluation and supplementary exams.

Research and Development

- Research and Development committee carries out various seminars, workshops and symposium. The Committee focuses on applying and obtaining fund from various funding agencies. Weekly

meetings are conducted in order to create research awareness among faculty members. MPhil and PhD scholars are also encouraged to apply and obtain different programs to be conducted at the college. • Research centre and research Lab have been established. Staff and students are encouraged to submit minor and major projects .They are given incentives for paper publication. Staff can get seed money from the Management for research. For research students ,chemicals are sponsored by the Management. • Research Grants are provided by the Management for National and International Publications. One staff of Bioscience was permitted to attend the 31st UGC -NRCBF winter school programme at M.K.University, the registration was given free by the Management

The Context: The maintenance of zero plastic , eco - friendly campus aims to reduce PollutionThe Plastic articles and covers injure the trees and plants by damaging their foliage and impairing the process of

photosynthesis (Foodmaking). They also weaken the trees by making them more susceptible to other health problems such as insects and diseases. These problems can be solved by the eradication of plastic articles and covers. The Practice: In order to promote zero plastic campus, the students clean the entire campus once a month. All the plastic articles and covers are removed and the campus is maintained neat and clean. The NSS, YRC and the Eco club of the college play vital roles in maintaining ecofriendly environment by planting saplings. Evidence of Success: The NSS, YRC and the Eco club have made it a regular practice of organizing sapling plantation, rain water harvesting and plastic eradication as a part of their extension activities. There are three big ponds created at the backyard of MBA Block which can collect and store rain water from rooftops via pipes during the monsoon season. They help to supplement the underground water resources .The stored water is used to water trees and plants. The beautiful campus accommodates more than 2000 trees which shelter rare flora and fauna. During the monsoon season, the trees can absorb around 50,000 litres of water. Solar plant facility is provided for geysers in the hostels to reduce electricity usage. Automatic electric incinerators have been installed to destroy the used sanitary pads. Green house is maintained by the Department of Bioscience. Problems encountered and Resources Required: Water scarcity during the summer season was the problem encountered during sapling plantation. To overcome this problem, Drip Irrigation was introduced on the campus. Notes: Nowadays, more emphasis is laid on environment based education, which looks after the cleanliness and hygiene of the surroundings.
